**UPDATED: NEW IRS STANDARD MILEAGE RATES FOR 2023** 

Effective January 1, 2023, the HCOE mileage reimbursement rate will increase. HCOE Superintendent's Policies 4133.1, 4233.1, and 4333.1 state, in part, that reimbursement for the use of a personal vehicle shall be at a per-mile rate to conform to the Internal Revenue Service allowable rate.

The standard mileage rate for business is based on an annual study of the fixed and variable costs of operating an automobile. On December 29, 2022, the IRS issued the standard mileage reimbursement rates for 2023. The updated rate for business miles driven in a personal car will increase to 65.5¢ per mile beginning January 1, 2023.

The internal codename for the Lenovo ThinkPad 11e Chromebook is glimmer which is used to build recovery media for your Convertible or to create a custom build of ChromiumOS. The Lenovo ThinkPad 11e Chromebook launched with ChromeOS R34 and is currently on R. The Lenovo ThinkPad 11e Chromebook comes with 16 GB of internal disk space and 4 GB of system RAM.

You may of course continue to use your Lenovo ThinkPad 11e Chromebook if it suits your needs if you want to accept the risks of using a device without the latest security updates. Entering Developer Mode on Lenovo ThinkPad 11e Chromebook

You can place your Lenovo ThinkPad 11e Chromebook into developer mode and gain access to additional debug and development features in ChromeOS. It is not advised to put your primary device into developer mode as it can allow you to compromise the security and stability of your Convertible. Devices placed into developer mode will emit a loud audable sound on boot as well as display a warning message for several seconds to advise the user that their device is in developer mode. Depending on any changes you make to your device, it may prevent you from being able to get future upgrades from Google unless you restore your Convertible using a factrory image.

The ability to put your Convertible into developer mode may be disallowed by your administrator if you are a managed device issued by a school or business.

## ChromiumOS Build Instructions

When a Google Chromebook is past its End of Life (EOL) Date, it will stop getting upstream security updates and features. # **REQUIRES ACTION BY APRIL 1, 2023**

The Political Reform Act requires certain officials and employees who serve in positions designated in an agency's conflict-of-interest code to file a Statement of Economic Interests (Form 700) on an annual basis. Plainly stated, all district board members must annually file a Form 700 with the Humboldt County Office of Elections. Important: District boards that have already submitted Form 700s are still receiving this notice to meet legal notice requirements.

## Types of Filers

There are three types of filers: (1) Assuming Office; (2) Annual; and (3) Leaving Office.

Assuming Office: Filers assuming office must file within 30 days of assuming office.

Annual:

Filers continuing to serve must file between January 1 – April 1, 2023. This

includes board members who have been reappointed/reelected to serve

another term without a break in service.

Leaving Office: Filers leaving office must file within 30 days of leaving office.

## Filers by Type

### Deadline

Annual Form 700s are due to the Office of Elections on or before April 1, 2023. Late statements are subject to a \$10 per day late fine. Note: The Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) is increasing its efforts to penalize non-filers.

### **Required Form**

Each year the FPPC issues a required form for reporting. Our office is only authorized to accept the 2022-2023 official form for reporting year 2022. Filers using the wrong form will be required to refile their Form 700 on the correct form. A courtesy Form 700 cover page template is enclosed and an electronic copy of the 2022-2023 Statement of Economic Interests Form 700 Packet can be obtained at https://www.fppc.ca.gov/Form700.html

## **Annual Reporting Period**

The annual reporting period is January 1 – December 31, 2022. Filers who filed an assuming or leaving office Form 700 between October 1 – December 31, 2022, are not required to file an annual Form 700.

## Completing the Form 700

The Form 700 includes five sections: (1) Office, (2) Jurisdiction, (3) Type of Statement, (4) Schedule Summary, and (5) Verification. All five sections must be fully and correctly completed.

**Note**: The Form 700 is a legal document. If a section is incomplete or incorrect, the filer must file an amendment.

**Note**: Please do not use white-out on this form. Form 700s bearing white-out will be returned and an amendment will be required.

## Filing the Form 700

An original, signed Form 700 must be filed with the Office of Elections on or before April 1, 2023. Unsigned, incomplete, and incorrect Form 700s will require an amendment. Form 700s can be mailed or hand-delivered to the Office of Elections.

## **Electronic District Filing of 700 forms**

Visitors are welcomed at Cutten School and sign in at the school office. Due to the close-knit nature of our school, unfamiliar visitors on campus are very rare and are immediately greeted by school personnel.

Cutten Elementary School was built in 1951. The school has fourteen regular classrooms, a library, a multipurpose room, and facilities for student support resources, music, social services/counseling, speech and our after-school program. Facilities also include two baseball fields, a multi-dimensional playground structure, three wall ball courts, and a large athletic field. A new playground structure was installed in the summer of 2020.

#### **Professional Development**

The Cutten District implemented the Leadership Team in 2014. Teachers apply to be on the team and receive an annual stipend of \$2,000. This Team, that includes all administrators, meets weekly to plan professional development opportunities for teachers and evaluate the effectiveness of professional development opportunities offered. This year the team is focusing on the Science of Reading, Math Identity, and Universal Design for Learning. Input is regularly sought from certificated staff to identify areas of focus for professional development. Professional development is offered during our preservice days at the beginning of each school year, an inservice day mid-year, and during our early release collaborative Wednesdays.

The District reimburses teachers for registration to selected professional development opportunities offered through the County Office of Education, and other professional resources.

To evaluate our system for professional growth and improvement for teachers, we survey certificated staff, teachers meet in grade level teams to assess needs, and we meet as a district several times a year to examine student achievement data to help assess need for professional development. New teachers participate in the Teacher Induction Program, formerly known as BTSA and are mentored by veteran teachers. The North Coast School of Education's (NCSOE) North Coast Teacher Induction Program (NCTIP) is a two-year program that provides a link between the skills acquired in the Preliminary Credential Program to the experiences in the classroom. Candidates work with a Mentor Teacher to further develop the knowledge and skills needed to achieve competency in the California Standards. Mentors provide support, experiences, and professional development to help candidates meet the CCTC requirements for a Clear Credential. When a new teacher is hired, experienced teachers provide continual support in all aspects of the profession. Grade level teams meet regularly to provide assistance and support to our newest teachers.

#### **School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements**

Ridgewood Elementary School provides a safe, clean, tobacco-free educational environment for students. One maintenance employee and two custodians ensure the good condition and cleanliness of our buildings, restrooms, and grounds. All classrooms and support services rooms are equipped with a telephone, an intercom system, and access to the Internet. A security system is present to protect every room.

Visitors are welcomed at Ridgewood School and sign in at the school office. Due to the close-knit nature of our school, unfamiliar visitors on campus are very rare and are immediately greeted by school personnel.

Ridgewood Elementary School was built in 1957. The school has 14 regular classrooms, a library, a multipurpose room (the commons, where assemblies take place one morning each week), a student support resource room (the Learning Lane), and a breakfast room, which is also available for small group instruction and to provide quality after-school care.

The playground has enjoyed recent equipment upgrades, and borders two baseball fields, a playing field, a wall ball court, and our own redwood forest. All facilities and equipment are designed for primary students.

#### **Professional Development**

The Cutten District implemented the Leadership Team in 2014. Teachers apply to be on the team and receive an annual stipend of \$2,000. This Team, that includes all administrators, meets weekly to plan professional development opportunities for teachers and evaluate the effectiveness of professional development opportunities offered. This year the team is focusing on the Science of Reading, Math Identity, and Universal Design for Learning. Input is regularly sought from certificated staff to identify areas of focus for professional development. Professional development is offered during our preservice days at the beginning of each school year, and in service day mid year and during our early release collaborative Wednesdays.

The District reimburses teachers for registration to selected professional development opportunities offered through the County Office of Education, and other professional resources.

To evaluate our system for professional growth and improvement for teachers, we survey certificated staff, teachers meet in grade level teams to assess needs, and we meet as a district several times a year to examine student achievement data to help assess need for professional development. New teachers participate in the Teacher Induction Program, formerly known as BTSA and are mentored by veteran teachers. The North Coast School of Education's (NCSOE) North Coast Teacher Induction Program (NCTIP) is a two-year program that provides a link between the skills acquired in the Preliminary Credential Program to the experiences in the classroom. Candidates work with a Mentor Teacher to further develop the knowledge and skills needed to achieve competency in the California Standards. Mentors provide support, experiences, and professional development to help candidates meet the CCTC requirements for a Clear Credential. When a new teacher is hired, experienced teachers provide continual support in all aspects of the profession. Grade level teams meet regularly to provide assistance and support to our newest teachers.

We would like to begin by thanking Amy Morris for their concern and for taking the time to complete the Request for Reconsideration form in regards to *Jack, Skinny Bones, and the Golden Pancake*, by Elizabeth Chandler. We have read the request and at this time the Library Committee has decided that it is in the best interest of the school library to keep the material in question in circulation in the Ridgewood Library.

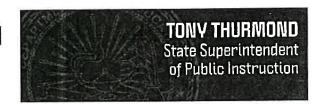
Before the meeting, the Library Committee read the Request for Reconsideration and spent time researching the possible frightening aspects of *Jack, Skinny Bones, and the Golden Pancake*, which was the chief objection to this item. First, it was determined that the book had a cataloging error and had been placed in the Easy Fiction portion of the collection in 1996, though the books title page had a cataloging designation of 398.2, which is where Fairytales, Folk stories, and Legends are housed in the collection. Moreover, the material in question is stated on the author's note as being a modern telling of a trickster tale like Grimm's fairytales, but set in the southwest, and should be considered as such. Lastly, the material is deemed suitable for students aged 3-8 years of age, as stated in each review we encountered, and on the title page of the book.

At this time we ask the school board to approve the Cutten Library Committees decision to keep Jack, Skinny Bones, and the Golden Pancakes, by Elizabeth Chandler in the Ridgewood library for circulation, with the understanding that the book in question will be reclassified to the appropriate section of the collection in 398.2 ~ Fairytales, Folk stories, and Legends.

Overview of education-related funding included in the Governor's Budget for 2023-24

On January 10, 2023, Governor Gavin Newsom released his budget spending plan for 2023–24. The following provides information on the governor's proposals that affect preschool through grade twelve education.

Official state budget documents are available through the California Department of Finance (DOF) website (<a href="https://dof.ca.gov/">https://dof.ca.gov/</a>).

#### **OVERVIEW**

The Governor's Budget forecasts General Fund revenues to be \$29.5 billion lower than at the 2022 Budget Act projections. With the lower projected revenues, California is estimating a budget gap of \$22.5 billion in the 2023–24 FY. The Governor's budget proposal maintains reserves of \$35.6 billion in 2023–24 and continues to improve investments in education for schools, students, and teachers.

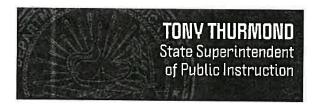
#### **PROPOSITION 98**

- Provides \$108.8 billion Proposition (Prop) 98 funding for kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12) schools for 2023-24, a decrease of \$1.5 billion from the 2022-23 Budget Act funding level.
  - o Increase in Prop 98 funding level in 2021–22 of \$200 million but a decrease in 2022–23 of \$3.5 billion.
- Provides \$23,723 in total K-12 per-pupil expenditures from all sources projected in 2023-24.
- Provides \$17,519 K-12 per-pupil expenditures from Prop 98 funds in 2023-24, an increase of \$526 per pupil over 2022-23 funding levels.
- Rebenches Test 1 Prop 98 from 38.3 percent to 38.6 percent of the General Fund (GF) to account for enrollment increases related to the expansion of transitional kindergarten (TK).

#### PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM STABILIZATION ACCOUNT (PSSSA)

- Projects a deposit into PSSSA will be required in 2021–22, in the amount of \$3.7 billion, \$1.1 billion in 2022–23, and \$365 million in 2023–24.
  - o The deposit will result in a projected balance of \$8.5 billion, below the \$9.5 billion projected in the 2022–23 Budget Act.
  - o This balance is greater than 3 percent of the total K–12 share of the Prop 98 amount, which continues the school district reserve caps of 10 percent that began in 2022–23.

#### LOCAL CONTROL FUNDING FORMULA (LCFF)

- The Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) is 8.13 percent, the highest in recent memory, which results in a \$4.2 billion Prop 98 GF increase for the LCFF.
- County Offices of Education (COE): increase of \$51.7 million Prop 98 GF to reflect an 8.13 percent COLA adjustment and average daily attendance (ADA) changes applicable to the LCFF.
- Includes \$300 million ongoing Prop 98 GF for an equity multiplier, an add-on to LCFF.
- Proposes amendments to the K–12 accountability and continuous improvement system to ensure equity gaps are identified and addressed through the Local Control and Accountability Plan and Differentiated Assistance process.

#### **RESERVES**

- Overall, the budget has \$35.6 billion set aside in reserves.
- The Rainy Day Fund balance is projected to be \$22.4 billion in 2023–24, the constitutional maximum mandatory deposit limit of 10 percent of the GF.
- Maintains \$900 million in the Safety Net Reserve.
- A total of \$8.5 billion in the Public School System Stabilization Account.
- Reserves of \$3.8 billion in the Special Fund for Economic Uncertainties to address emergencies and other unforeseen events.

#### **PENSIONS**

Includes \$3.9 billion GF for statutorily required state contribution to CalSTRS.

#### **EARLY EDUCATION**

- Continues expanded eligibility for TK with \$690 million to implement the second year of TK expansion, expanding eligibility to children turning five years old between September 2 and April 2 (approximately 46,000 children). Full implementation of universal TK is expected in 2025–26.
- Provides \$165 million to support the addition of one certificated or classified staff person in TK classrooms.
- Builds on 2022–23 Budget Act with \$64.5 million Prop 98 GF and \$51.8 million non-98 GF to continue a multiyear plan to ramp up the inclusivity adjustments for the California State Preschool Program (CSPP), the second year of a three-year ramp up, with the final requirement that students with disabilities make up at least 7.5 percent of CSPP providers' enrollment.

 Delays the 2023–24 planned \$550 million Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program investment to 2024–25.

#### **LITERACY**

- Builds on the 2022–23 Budget Act by providing an additional \$250 million one-time Prop 98 GF for the existing Literacy Coaches and Reading Specialists Grant Program.
- Uses a \$1 million one-time GF to create a Literacy Roadmap to help educators navigate resources effectively and efficiently.

#### **SPECIAL EDUCATION**

- The budget proposes several programmatic changes:
  - o Limiting the amount of funding that Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPAs) are allowed to retain for nondirect student services before allocating special education base funding to their member local educational agencies.
  - o Stabilizing current SELPA membership by extending the moratorium on creating new single-district SELPAs by two years, from June 30, 2024, to June 30, 2026.
  - o Increasing fiscal transparency by requiring CDE to post each SELPA's annual local plan on its website, including its governance, budget, and services plans.

#### **EDUCATOR WORKFORCE**

 The Governor's Budget does not propose changes to existing programs or additional educator workforce investments but states that the Administration is committed to the thoughtful implementation of existing educator programs in the coming year.

#### ARTS AND CULTURAL ENRICHMENT

- Calculates the amount required to be allocated under the Arts and Music in Schools Funding Guarantee and Accountability Act, as established by Prop 28 during the 2022 General Election, at \$941.
- Proposes to reduce the Arts, Music, and Instructional Materials Discretionary Block Grant, established in the 2022–23 Budget Act, by \$1.2 billion, from \$3.5 billion to \$2.3 billion.
- Proposes \$100 million one-time Prop 98 GF to provide high school seniors with access to cultural enrichment experiences.
  - o This equates to about \$200 per twelfth-grade student.

- · Facilities:

- 1. The Application documents will be completed to satisfy the requirements of OPSC. The Application documents will be audited by SchoolWorks to ensure their mathematical accuracy. Responsibility for the accuracy of data supplied by the District lies with the District.
- 2. This agreement does not include the preparation of any of the documents necessary for the purchase of land.
- 3. SchoolWorks's Application services generally do not include the preparation of site drawings or 1A Facility Diagrams, although the school campus maps received from the District typically need to be cleaned up and labeled appropriately by SchoolWorks staff per the application submittal requirements.
